1 in 5 seniors reported losing money to scammers.*

Perceptions & Assumptions:

- More assets & disposable income
- Excellent credit
- Polite, well-mannered, trusting
- Less likely to report
- Isolation, dependency or fear
- Loss of physical or mental acuity

Charity Scams

- Often occur after a natural disaster or tragic event.
- Ask questions and do your research. Check with the BBB's Wise Giving Alliance – <u>www.give.org</u>.
 -20 Standards of Charity Accountability.
- Is this a charity or professional fundraiser?
- Do not feel intimidated to give. Do your research to ensure your hard-earned money is going to good cause.









Online Purchase Scams

- Be careful who you buy from. Do some research first! Beware of too-good-to-be-true deals. Scammers may offer free or very low prices on hard-to-find items.
- Items either don't arrive, are substandard or counterfeit
- Think before you click. Be especially cautious about emails and online ads on social media.
- Shop with a credit card for extra protection.

Increased Risk of Online Purchase Scams During Holiday Seasons

Beware of Free-Trial Offers

Offers come with **fine print hidden**, giving people a **short window to receive, evaluate, and return the product**. Hidden info also states by accepting the free-trial offer, the **consumer is signing up for monthly shipments of the product with fees** charged to their credit card.

TIPS FOR AVOIDING

Never send money to someone you have never met face-to-face.



2 Don't click on links or open attachments in unsolicited email or text messages.





Don't believe everything you see. Scammers are great at mimicking official seals, fonts, and other details. Just because a website or email looks official does not mean it is. Even Caller ID can be faked.

Don't buy online unless the transaction is

secure. Make sure the website has "https" in the URL (the extra s is for "secure") and a small lock icon on the address bar. Even then, the site could be shady. Research the company first at **BBB.org**.

TIPS FOR AVOIDING A SCAM

- 5 Be extremely cautious when dealing with anyone you've met online.
- 6 Never share personally identifiable information with someone who has contacted you unsolicited.



- 7 Don't be pressured to act immediately.
- 8 Use secure, traceable transactions when making payments for goods, services, taxes, and debts.
- Whenever possible, work with businesses that have proper identification, licensing, and insurance.





Be cautious about **what you share on** social media.



If you feel that "something isn't right."



Listen to your gut & investigate further!



Knowledge is Power!

49% that **did not engage** with a scam had some knowledge of scammer methods and behaviors **beforehand**.

Government Impersonation

- Caller says you have a warrant out for your arrest and must pay fine (usually gift card or cryptocurrency payment)
- Caller may say you missed court
- Virginia court case records can be searched at: https://www.vacourts.gov/caseinfo/home.html



Jury Duty Scams

Victim receives phone call saying they missed jury duty and must pay fine to avoid imprisonment.
